

2018 Central Health Southeast Health and Wellness Center Update



PelotonU is an Austin non-profit providing working adults a path to earn their Bachelor's degree.

23% of the Central Texas workforce has started college and not yet graduated. With traditional options these students have a 16% of earning their degree, whereas PelotonU offers a 78% chance to the same students, almost always without debt.

PelotonU is not a college - they match students with high-quality online universities and then provide inperson study spaces and weekly coaching to provide the necessary flexibility and support (<u>KVUE Feature</u>).



After working in St. John's for three years, PelotonU launched their second location in the Central Health Southeast Health and Wellness Center(SEHWC) in August 2017. Since then, average utilization has grown from 12 students per week to 27, with 7 per day studying from the SEHWC in March, 2018.

18 students study exclusively at the SEHWC, with another 20 using the space less frequently when it's available between 3p and 9p Monday to Thursday. Average age for students is 26, and average income is \$24,000. 75% will be the first in their family to earn a degree.



The Central Health SEHWC is FarmShare's highest-performing mobile market, both in overall sales and in SNAP and Double Dollars redemption. It is one of seven markets but accounts for 25.5% of total sales. The market provides an opportunity for the community to access fresh produce. It's at SEHWC every Thursday from 10-12pm.
